The Hidden Cost of Convenience: The Environmental **Toll of Paper Towels**

In the U.S. alone, it is estimated that around 13 billion pounds of paper towels are used each year, which requires the harvesting of about 100 million trees. The production process consumes substantial natural resources, including over 2.5 billion gallons of water and millions of kilowatt-hours of energy.

Kim's Story: My household has cut our paper towel usage in half by utilizing Swedish washcloths which can be washed in the dishwasher or washing machine. Each cloth can replace up to 15 rolls of paper towels. I bought 12 for under \$8.00 at Costco.

The site of our January Walk n Talk will be Hidden Waters Preserve. The 90-acre site, formerly known as the Eichelberger Sink was acquired by the Lake County Water Authority to protect a sinkhole lake at the center (Lake

Alfred) which drains slowly into the aquifer. The outer edges of the preserve are sandhill restoration areas with long-leaf pines and abundant gopher tortoises.

Grandma Pepicelli's Zucchini Bread Recipe Submitted by Cindy Bennett

3 eggs beaten with 1 cup of oil. Mix well with spoon.

Add:

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Stir in:

- 2 cups shredded zucchini
- 18 ounce can crushed pineapple, drained

Add:

- 3 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda

Mix and add:

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Add:

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup nuts (pecans or walnuts)

Grease 2 loaf pans, add ingredients and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Cool bread for 10 minutes before releasing the loaves.
